5 Things You Need To Know

For those of you who haven't been members for a long time, we thought we should share some information on how (and why) the club operates as it does. When you look at the board, who represents well over 100 years of club experience, we do things because we've always done it that way. So maybe we should explain some things.

- 1. When you join, we give you access to the web site with a password. We also give you a physical membership card. That's not done to use up our stock of business cards. That membership card is valuable. If you present it to certain local vendors, like Rockler, Woodcraft, and others, you can get a 10% discount on your purchase. So don't just toss it in a drawer. Keep it with you and save some money.
- 2. The list of these companies can be found on the website once you sign in under RE-SOURCES > OUR PREFERRED VENDORS. This includes several mail-order vendors as well. So, if you are making an on-line order, check this list before you hit CHECK OUT.
- 3. When you completed the membership form, one of the questions was "Add to Vendor Discount Mailing List?" Some on-line vendors require that we send an authenticated list that they can check against for the discount. If you didn't check that box, we won't send your name and you won't get the discount. Contact Member-ship@fvwwc.org if you change your mind. Of course, we are constantly updating that list as new members join.
- 4. The membership is for the entire family. Feel free to bring your spouse, children, even grandchildren. Woodworking can tend to be a lonely hobby but it doesn't need to be. If your entire family is interested, it can be a bonding experience where you can pass on skills and safety. Of course, you may never be able to find your center punch or your tape measure.
- 5. The website isn't just for email, newsletters, and classifieds. There are a number of capabilities under RESOURCES, such as plans, patterns, tutorials, and some things hiding under DOCUMENTS. Check them out. If you want, you can even add to them, sharing some of your information. You also have the ability to start your own blog or a forum.

The Steamship Arabia

Steamship Arabia Museum

Marcia and I visited the Steamship Arabia Museum in Kansas City, MO on our way to Arizona in March. What we saw were amazing exhibits of pre-Civil War era tools, hardware, clothing, shoes, dishes, and glassware salvaged from the wreck of this steamship.

The Steamship Arabia sailed the Missouri River in the 1850's. In those days, the river defined the western boundary of the United States and river towns like Kansas City were provisioning and launching points for settlers heading west



into Indian country. Steamships sailed the river bringing settlers and cargo to these frontier towns. Unfortunately, the Steamship Arabia and its 200 tons of cargo sank into the muddy river waters on September 5, 1856. About 6 miles upriver from Kansas City, the steamship hit a large submerged snag. The only passenger fatality was a mule that was tied to a post on deck. Pretty much all of the passengers' personal luggage and all the cargo were lost when the steamship sank out of sight into the mud and silt of the river bottom. Within 24 hours, only the smokestacks and a bit of the pilot house were still visible and even those were shortly swept away by the current. In the early years, there were a few attempts at salvaging the vessel, but were mostly unsuccessful. (Somehow, the 60 or so barrels of Kentucky whiskey on-deck did mysteriously disappear.)



The steamship was lost and forgotten for over 130 years until a private group searched and found her buried 45 feet below a Missouri cornfield and about one-half mile from the current river channel. The field owner granted permission to dig for the steamship after fall harvest and work began late 1987. Twenty wells were drilled around the site to drain water from the excavation. The steamship and its cargo were found amazingly well preserved by the dense coating of mud and silt.


The team recovered a treasure trove of common household goods and luxury items too; many look like they just came from the factory after being carefully cleaned by the team. We spent several hours viewing displays of the recovered items – I thought the tool and hardware collection might be of particular interest to FVWWC members. 

When cleaning up the shop some of the dust bunnies were stuck in the corners. They really like hiding there, so I took the floor attachment off, and made a pass in the corners.







Craigslist

When searching for something on Craigslist, it's possible to save the search and be notified by email whenever that item gets posted. I've purchased 2 Sawstop's that way. Keep in mind that a Sawstop or something like it is likely to have many replies. An offer to pay more, not dicker, and bring cash green dollars put right in the subject line might help when competition is tight.

Many of us use runners for jigs in our tablesaw, bandsaws, router tables, etc. I typically use a piece of hardwood, and you inevitably deal with swelling and shrinking due to the seasons.

One way around this is to use a plastic cutting board. These are often made of polyethylene and are easy to cut and machine with our woodworking tools. They do not change size and are "slick" which helps in their motion which means they can be cut precisely to fit the slots.

And, best of all, they are fairly inexpensive. <u>This example</u>: Amazon Winco CBWT-1218 Cutting Board, 12 by 18 by 1/2-Inch, White is 12x18 inches, costs \$7.49, and could make quite a few jigs. Other sizes and colors are also available.





Stacking Sawhorse Bench

I have made two of these great sawhorses, one for me and another for my son-in-law.

Separate, the pieces make two very sturdy sawhorses and stacked, they make a nice small work bench. The sawhorses are made from construction lumber - two 10 ft 2 x 12's, two 8 ft 2 x 4's, and about 6 ft of 1 x 6 pine. While I had some difficulty finding decent flat lumber at the big box store, after some sorting through the pile I found a few acceptable boards. The total cost was around \$50. The benches took me only a couple of hours to make and will replace some wobbly old 2 x 4 sawhorses I have had for many years. They will be nice to use at a jobsite as a work bench, will be stable and safe stepping stools for home repair, and of course are rock solid shop sawhorses. When I am building case furniture, I like to elevate the case to a more convenient height. My old sawhorses were too tall and flimsy to do this; these benches will support anything I am likely to make.





You can adjust the leg lengths to use the stacked bench as an infeed or outfeed support for your table saw. Or, just adjust the design to your desired sawhorse and bench height. If you are interested in building your own, the article is in the April / May 2014 American Woodworker magazine. I am sure Roland can get you that issue.

When doing handcut dovetails, the hardest part is chopping the waste out between the pins, especially in hard maple. I cheat by using my router table. I clamp the pin board vertically to a block cut with a rabbet for backside clearance. The block keeps the board stable while routing. Visibility is limited so I stay a little away from the pins and clean up with a sharp chisel.






